

#### MADILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

I. Topics addressed this school year and actions taken:

The Madill School PTO/Site Based Committees work closely together, identifying school-wide needs, and then providing the input and means by which to address each need. The focus for both groups this year has been a continuation of enhancing school safety. Along with school safety, Site Base also looked to improve the communication between home and school, helping to make our families more aware of upcoming events, activities, and school initiatives. Both groups meet once a month to discuss issues that directly affect our students and their families. Members of our Site Based Committee are: Christina Reynolds, Merin Merna, Denise Legacy, Angela Curatolo, Sandy McCarthy, Christy Lust, Katie Lesperance, Angie Davis, Stacie O'Shea, Carrie Sholette, Carrie Wright, Terri Demers, Bethany Haynes, and Sherry Paradis.

• Student Safety was enhanced by the addition of a School Safety Committee. Our Safety Committee is made up of first responders, parents, and teachers. Members of the committee are: Connor Sutton (NYS Trooper), Donald McCarthy (Ogdensburg Fire Department), Barb Buscemi (Madill School Nurse), Michael Durham (Ogdensburg City Police), Angela Curatolo (parent), Sherry Paradis (parent), Amy Lemke (teacher), and Jim McCarthy (Director of Buildings and Grounds). The Committee met twice this year and as a result of our meetings, it was pointed out that the route we were taking to the Pepsi Plant for evacuation was not the safest for our students. After discussion with first responders, the suggestion was made for us to proceed down Adams Avenue instead of Mansion Avenue, in order for us to get students off Pine Street, as that is where the first responders will travel. Also discussed were protocols for fire drills, or emergencies, which resulted in students being outside during the winter

months. This discussion was brought about by the fire drill and consequent evacuation that occurred this past winter at Madill. As a result, all classrooms have been equipped with "Grab-N-Go-Warm Emergency Blankets" to wrap students in to keep them warm, until an evacuation is ordered or we are allowed to go back in the building.



- PTO fundraisers for this year included: Madill's annual Green Gravy Dinner, Fall/Spring Book Fairs, Yankee Candle, Art to Remember, and School Mall. Monies collected were used mainly to pay for busing our class fieldtrips. As PTO plans fundraisers, they are aware of the financial burden they may play on our families. Keeping this in mind, PTO has been able to cut down yearly fundraisers to two major fundraisers that generate enough revenue to support fieldtrips and needs for our school. These are also supported by one or two other smaller school fundraisers.
- Student/Community Service Centered Learning Projects continue to support the community in which our students live, and instill the need to give back to that community. Some of this year's projects were: JDRF Hat Day, St. Jude's Bike-A-Thon, PJ's 4 X-Mas, Ronald McDonald House, SPCA, Autism Walk, Ogdensburg Boys & Girls Club, and Ogdensburg Snack Pack Program.
- Arts in Education and OCP provide our students with performances that provide life lessons and instill
  values that will help them navigate through their school years. This year's performances included: "Jeff
  Boyer's Bubble Trouble" that focused on exploring how energy makes our world work via interactive
  demonstrations. OCP performances included: "Pete the Cat," "From the Mixed up Files of Mrs. Basil E.
  Frankweiler," "Otherwise Known as Sheila the Great," and last but not least..."Dr. Seuss' Cat in the
  Hat."
- Site Based/PTO initiatives continue to provide our students and families with experiences to enhance their elementary school years. The initiatives included: providing funding for PBIS, supporting/funding Madill's Fun Day, and organizing Madill's Fall and Spring Book Fairs by supplying parent volunteers. Funds and assistance were provided for Madill's Green Gravy Dinner, It's the Great Pumpkin, Madill's Holiday Family Happening, Build-a-Book Night, Spring Fling, and our 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Graduation. As always, funding was provided for all class fieldtrips, and Madill's PTO continues to sponsor two senior scholarships of \$200 each, to two senior students that spent their elementary years at Madill. This

year's recipients were seniors; Lindsay Beach and Garrett Bell. As was stated, a focus for Site Base/PTO this year was improving home/school communication. Working toward this goal, a sign for Madill School was purchased to announce monthly activities and share information about what is important and happening at our school. The sign was mounted on our building and it provides all with reminders of what parents need to know. Thank you Site Base/PTO!



- Our Student Council is made up of our students in grades 4 6 and provide our classes and community with help and support. In addition to providing assistance to our younger students during special activities, Student Council has also been involved in fundraising that includes: PJ's 4 X-Mas, where 51 pair of PJ's were donated, as well as, \$291.60 in monetary donations was raised. Students also supported the SPCA, the OEA Community Dinner, the Ogdensburg Boys and Girls Club, and Ogdensburg Snack Pack.
- Madill Elementary greatly appreciates the support we receive from our community. This year we were
  the proud recipients of a "Buddy Bench" that was donated to us by the Kiwanis Club of Ogdensburg.
  This bench which will be located on our playground and will serve to promote friendship and inclusion
  among all of our students. Many thanks to the Kiwanis Club!



• UNICEF Kid Power continues to grow at Madill. Again, this year our 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students participated in an effort sponsored by UNICEF to provide nourishing food packets to needy children around the world. Students were each given a UNICEF Power Band, part pedometer, part accelerometer. The band measured steps and movement, converting them to Kid Power Points that unlocked lifesaving packets of food for malnourished children around the world. In addition to their daily "steps," students enhanced their steps by participating in a walking program from 7:30 – 8:05 in the gym, as well as extra "steps" after students finished their lunch. This year our students exceeded their goal from last year as they "saved" 7 children and earned over 1,000 packets of food. Because of this, our classes were sent a congratulatory video thanking them for their efforts.

#### Assessments

# **PALS**

#### *Universal Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 2*

The Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening or PALS is administered to students in Universal Pre-Kindergarten through Grade 2. In Universal Pre-Kindergarten, Junior Kindergarten, and Kindergarten, the assessment measures a child's knowledge of several foundational literacy skills such as rhyme awareness, beginning sound awareness, alphabet recognition, letter sound knowledge, and word awareness and identification. In Grades 1 and 2, the assessment measures word knowledge and oral reading skills.

This assessment, along with the Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA 2), allows teachers to match literacy instruction to individual literacy needs. It also helps to identify children who are behind in their acquisition of fundamental literacy skills.

Students' scores on specific tasks are compared to a benchmark that represents minimum expectations for fall and spring. If a student's score is below the benchmark, that student may receive small group (Academic Intervention Services) reading instruction in addition to the regular classroom literacy instruction.

# DRA 2

#### Kindergarten – Grade 2

The Developmental Reading Assessment 2 (DRA 2) is a standardized reading assessment used to determine a student's instructional reading level. Classroom teachers administer the DRA individually to students. This assessment allows a teacher to observe, record, and evaluate a student's oral reading fluency and comprehension skills. As a result, teachers can them match their instruction to each student's needs.

### **IRA**

#### Grades 3 - 6

The Independent Reading Assessment (IRA) is a whole book comprehension assessment, fiction and non-fiction; it includes lessons to help teachers turn the formative assessment into instruction. Teachers also reference the *Reading Strategies Book* to support the independent instruction in developing skilled readers.

Students complete the assessment on their own, during independent reading. Through evaluation, teachers learn ways that will guide their ongoing teaching during conferring, small groups, guided reading, and whole class reading instruction.

# Dr. Grant C. Madill Elementary School Goals for 2018 – 19:

- Foster the implementation of the Positivity Project to empower our students to build positive relationships and reinforce the "Other People Matter" mindset.
- Continue focus on Student Safety by coordinating needs with Madill Safety Committee, meeting at least twice a year.
- Continue to foster DASA (Dignity for All Students Act) by providing students with character education, through Arts in Education, and a monthly focus on Positivity Project Character Strengths (e.g., perseverance, hope, enthusiasm, fairness).
- Continue to collaborate with the Snack Pack Coalition to foster the weekend snack program for both elementary schools.
