





ENGLISH DEPARTMENT END OF YEAR REPORT 2017-2018

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

The implementation of the English Language Arts for the Common Core continued again this year. English teachers have taken the four modules and applied them to their individual grade level curriculum. Mr. Rabideau used bits and pieces of the modules in conjunction with selections from the Prentice Hall edition of the Common Core textbook. Using copies of excerpts from the selections imbedded in the modules, Mr. Rabideau once again required the students to continue doing a monthly independent reading assignment and worked with Melissa Starks to tweak the research module used in the OFA Library.

Mr. Donnelly's report will focus on grades 7, 9, and 10, which he taught this year.

- He began integrating Google Classroom into all of his classes this year. This is a computer-based program that organizes assignments, allows collaboration, and increases communication between his students and himself. It has been a huge success.
- Many students increased their reading levels by two to three years. The DRA scores (grade 7) were used to place students in grade level independent reading books. The STAR Reading test was administered three times.
- The Seven Habits of Good Readers was taught to the 7th grade students. This included independent reading, activating schema, creation of images, asking questions, and making text connections.
- He used the Collins Writing method in his classroom. Collins Writing is an organized writing plan that every student and teacher can use.

Mr. Donnelly's curriculum was centered on the Common Core Standards for Grade 7-12.

Mrs. Claxton continued to utilize the Read 180 program in her classes.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

The aforementioned research module that Mr. Rabideau required of his English 10 students enabled them to utilize the resources of the library to complete four distinct projects: an historical figure, an author, an historical event, and an area of entertainment. All four projects continue to be part of their third marking period average for English 10.

Mr. Donnelly stated that the projects and activities that students in English 7, 9, 10 accomplished this year were impressive.

- Each student in grade 7 worked toward reading a minimum of 10 independent reading books.
- Common Core modules for <u>A Long Walk to Water</u> and <u>Lyddie</u> were taught.
- In grade 7 students wrote a narrative account set during the 1960's that connected with the novel <u>The Outsiders</u>.
- 7th grade students read numerous in-class novels, including <u>A Long Walk</u> to Water, <u>The Outsiders</u>, and <u>Lyddie</u>.
- Students wrote compare/contrast, expository and narrative essays.
- Google Slides projects were created that connected the 1960's to the book <u>The Outsiders</u> in grade 7.
- 7th grade students read and analyzed numerous nonfiction articles. Nonfiction reading is now a major focus in the Common Core.
- Poetry was studied in grade 7, 9, 10.
- New York State test preparation for grade 7 was a focus during April.
- 9th and 10th grade students read numerous in-class novels and plays, including Messenger, Of Mice and Men, "Romeo and Juliet", Friday Night Lights, the "Palace Thief."
- Students wrote diaries through the eyes of characters in Of Mice and Men.
- Students wrote compare/contrast, expository and argumentative essays.
- 9th and 10th grade students read numerous nonfiction articles. Nonfiction reading is a major focus in the Common Core.
- 7th, 9th and 10th grade students focused weekly on expansion of vocabulary. Vocabulary work is an aspect of class these students have struggled with.
- 7th, 9th and 10th grade students wrote many essays of differing types.
- 7th, 9th and 10th grade students had a strong focus on the use and understanding of literary terms.

• 7th, 9th and 10th grade students completed more than one research paper using MLA citation, and use of Google Slides.

III. Student activities and achievements.

Students continue to use two websites as part of the English 10 curriculum. The TED Talks and NEWSELA websites enable the students to read, to view, and to listen to various nonfiction articles and presentations on a variety of topics.

All of Mrs. Claxton's students completed the R Book.

Mr. Donnelly stated that in grades 7, 9, 10 progress was made in reading and writing. Recommendation lists of students for Advanced English 8A, and 11A for next year were prepared.

Fifty students performed in "Annie" sponsored by the OFA Drama Club and OFA Music Department. Mr. Rabideau and Mrs. Pabis were codirectors of the event held in December 2017.

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

Members of the Drama Club had the opportunity to visit a series of venues relating to the dramatic arts. Students visited St. Lawrence University to see a traveling company's production of *Macbeth* and "Sense and Sensibility" in October 2017. The students also had the chance to go to Syracuse, New York to see the national tour of "Kinky Boots" during the month of March 2018. Plans for one musical are already in the planning stages for the fall.

Mr. Rabideau continued to be involved in the community as a District 26 Group Representative for Al-Anon. His participation in this family group initiative involves other groups in Canton, Potsdam, Massena, Hogansburg, Brushton, and Ogdensburg. He also was the Co-Chairperson and Banquet Speaker for the Spring Assembly / Convention 2018 held in Lake Placid on May 4-6, 2018.

All 7th graders took a field trip to the Lockwood arena as part of "Living History Day". The day focused on the French and Indian War time period and was a fantastic opportunity for personal growth in ELA and social studies.

Mrs. Billings participated in Gateways with juniors by creating resumes and working on interview etiquette. She also attended the College Fair in the fall.

Mr. Rabideau, Mr. Dinneen, Mrs. Billings, and Ms. Kurchoff chaperoned a group of AP seniors and all juniors when they attended a production of *The Great Gatsby* at Potsdam State in May 2018.

V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

The department has met regularly to discuss departmental concerns. Mr. Rabideau also advised the Drama Club in a variety of activities this year. Mr. Rabideau also participated in two book review sessions for the 2017-2018 school year. All of the 100 books reviewed for Ogdensburg and Morristown school districts are sent to the schools free of charge.

Mr. Donnelly participated in Right to Know, regular department meetings, and Google Classroom implementation.

Members of the English Department participated in the Positivity Project held at Kennedy School in March 2018. The teachers hope to implement the initiative in the fall.

All English teachers completed a Climate Survey for BOCES, and then mandated all of their students to do the student version of the survey.

VI. Goals for 2018-2019

Melissa Starks will continue to reach out again to the English teachers for cataloging class sets of module materials. This way everyone in the department will know which sets are stored in whose classroom. The materials are being collected on a schedule that fits everyone's time table so they could be cataloged, bar coded, and returned to the classroom for student use.

Mr. Donnelly will be teaching a diverse schedule next year including 8th, 10th and AP 12 English. He is excited by this new challenge and will work this summer in preparation for the coming school year.

Mr. Donnelly will continue to use the Collins Writing program in all classes in order to make the writing process more accessible to all students.

Mr. Donnelly will continue to base my teaching around the NYS Common Core Standards.


Mr. Donnelly will continue to strive for excellence in the Ogdensburg City School District, putting his talents to work for the students and the community.

END OF YEAR REPORT 2017-2018

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

Pam Bice

Pam made changes to the *Book of Life* film/ Day of the Dead unit for Spanish II by adding supplementary materials as well as Cornell Notes, and additionally incorporated clips from *Coco*, another newly released major motion picture about the influence that the Day of the Dead Celebration has on families.

Pam has incorporated a variety of Smart Notebook activities dealing with verb conjugation into her lessons from the new features she learned during tech camp. Pam also purchased 7 large, foam dice for students to use in groups to go along with a verb conjugation game/activity in which students conjugate verbs in both present and preterit tenses, exciting her students to conjugate verbs, one of the most complex tasks in learning a second language.

Additionally, Pam has worked to use the learning rubric/scale in the classroom more often with her Spanish 8/1 classes this year, attaching a card to each student desk. One side has a picture which is used to call on students randomly. The other side has the student learning rubric/scale as a way for students to evaluate themselves in their comfort with the material.

After visiting a school in New York City and attending the Teacher's College Saturday Reunion, Christina arranged the seating in her classroom to focus on collaboration, abandoning the U-shape for groups of four. This has allowed for increased opportunity to facilitate peer review of reading and writing, as encouraged by the Teacher's College Reading and Writing Project.

There have been no major changes in curriculum or the program offered to our students in French.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

Pam Bice

Pam continues to subscribe to Sr. Wooly's Educational Spanish Website of Music, Videos, and Games. The site continues to add a variety of new features such as nuggets that are broken down into different proficiency levels, "I can" statements, and many more listening, reading, and writing activities. The songs are great for reinforcing vocabulary and grammar in Spanish. Three new songs were added this year. The song "Feo" easily became the new favorite song for both Spanish 8 and 2 students and is perfect to learn during the personal identification/ description unit. Students completed listening, speaking, reading, and writing activities as well as a game that all go along with the new song.

Students enrolled in Spanish III communicated with students from a language focused high school in Italy in a pen pal program, writing and receiving letters each month, detailing their city and lives, as well as sharing information about their education and families.

For the French level IV/V combined class, Jon is providing student choice in designing a final project, for which he sets parameters.

III. Student activities and achievements.

Pam Bice

Spanish 8/I achievements: 78 out of 78 of Pam's Spanish 8/1 students received a score of 85% or higher on their midterm exam in January 2018. By the end of Spanish 8/1, students are able to write a 40 word note in Spanish. By the end of Spanish II, students are able to write a 100-word composition in Spanish.

Christina Frank

For their final exam, the Spanish V students will travel to Kennedy School to teach three, twenty-minute mini lessons to the grade five students, with the responsibility of lesson planning, encouraging repetition, and evaluating student learning. Of the ten students, each will earn credit for Spanish 104 (Intermediate Spanish – semester two) from St. Lawrence University. Similarly, students enrolled in Spanish IV will earn credit from SUNY Potsdam for Spanish 103 (Intermediate Spanish – semester one).

At the technology focused staff development day, Jon learned about screencastify—a video and audio sharing platform—which he will try to incorporate, along with Google classroom, into his classes next year.

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

Pam Bice

As a culminating activity for two or three holidays, the Spanish 8/1 and II students planned a fiesta and prepared authentic foods from Spanish-speaking countries.

Christina Frank

For the Spanish V unit on immigration, employees from U.S. Customs & Border Protection visited the classroom to discuss immigration law, as well as employment opportunities arising from knowledge of Spanish. Christina attended Spanish Immersion Day on the St. Lawrence University campus with ten students enrolled in Spanish V, participating in college level courses, communicating with high school students also enrolled in the college credit in high school course, and touring the campus with a Spanish-speaking guide.

I am planning a trip to France for Spring break of 2019.

V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

Pam attended the Summer Tech Camp that was provided by the St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES Model Schools Program from August 1-4, 2017. Pam is also a member of the National Honor Society Faculty Council for the high school, as well as serving on the interview team for the Middle School Principal position.

Christina Frank

Christina participated in the Principal's Academy staff development offered in conjunction with St. Lawrence University and St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES, beginning with a three-day long retreat at Camp Canaras, followed by one Friday each month of follow-up sessions. The program provided eye opening ideas for parental involvement, mindfulness, and staff development. As part of the Principal's Academy, Christina attended a weekend in New York City the featured school visits and the Teacher's College Reading and Writing Program Saturday Reunion. Additionally, Christina participated in the Positivity Project training, and is reading "Grit" by Angela Duckworth, a component she is excited to implement in the district, since ultimately our goal is to foster good people. Christina serves on the scholarship committee

and as yearbook advisor. Lastly, Christina is the Faculty Advisor for the OFA Key Club, a position which provided the opportunity to attend the New York District Leadership Training conference with Key Club members in March, a tremendous occasion to witness an entirely student led professional conference inspired by community service.

Jon participated in each of the staff development days for the calendar year, in addition to serving as an instructor for the new Theater Tech course and being highly involved in the set creation for the school production. Jon also serves as advisor for the French Club.

VI. Goals for 2017-2018 – revisited

Pam Bice

Again this year, I intend to further integrate more technology into my classroom as I will be attending a variety of mini-workshops on teaching strategies, instructional technology tools, online assessment tools, and programs during Summer Tech Camp from August 1-4, 2017.

I have incorporated a variety of new smart notebook activities, (mainly activities dealing with verb conjugation) into my lessons from the new features I learned about during the sessions I attended at Tech Camp in August 2017.

Christina Frank

I aspire to investigate the possibility of new textbooks for levels II and III, the only levels for which we utilize a textbook in teaching the Spanish curriculum. Pam and I ordered textbooks in our first year of teaching (2005-2006), and find that the cultural content and vocabulary from myriad chapters are out of date. For example, Spanish III includes a unit on technology and the newest device listed is an answering machine.

I have requested samples from three textbook companies and am currently working to compare their contents, as it relates to the two New York State Learning Standards for Languages Other Than English (language for communication and culture), as well as the textbooks adaptability to constantly changing language in today's world, to determine the best option for our program.

VII. Goals for 2018-2019

Christina Frank







- Hosted over 448 classes (7,770 students) in three core Subject Area of which I provided direct
 instruction/direction to print any electronic resources including our seventy-seven databases –
 we also offer our students access to 946 e-books for their research. All databases and e-books
 are available 24-7 with one login username and password.
- Collaborated with 26 different teachers (up from 13) on forty-two different research projects.
- Average over 285 students per day from Study Halls.
- Averaged over 384 items circulated monthly.
- Hosted Civil War Reenactor Mr. Paul Stillman in his 41st year of visitation to OFA.
- Continued to be a support to Cheryl Seymour, Librarian at Kennedy & Madill Elementary Schools.
- Created and collaborated with district Librarian Librarian Evaluation Tool.
- Mentored a neighboring District's School Librarian.
- Provided direction and instruction for/to the 7-12 Library Assistants.
- Provided direction to Teachers serving on Library Duty.
- We had a successful annual inventory on May 10 & 11 with a result of limited missing items.
- Purchased and cataloged over 1028 books and media that correlate to the Common Core, are High Interest/Low Reading Level, or for pleasure reading.
- Served on the District Technology Committee.
- As a member of each, I attended regularly scheduled Liaison meetings, Council meetings, and A/V Coordinator meetings, along with several Staff Development workshops provided by the St. Lawrence/Lewis (SLL) School Library System (SLS). I am completing my eighth year serving on Council at the School Library System where I have been asked to serve as Team Mentor for several less experienced Librarians in the field.
- Served on several committees for the SLL School Library System.
- Member of several professional organizations; American Library Association (ALA), New York Library Association (NYLA), School Librarian Association (SLLS), and the Northern New York School Librarians (NNYSL).
- This has been a growing year with training the 1.5 new Library Assistants, Mrs. Cole and Mrs.
 Mitchell, but it has been a great year of interaction with the students and faculty.

A strong school library is staffed by the library team of a state certified or licensed librarian supported by clerical assistance; has up-to-date books, materials, equipment and technology; includes regular collaboration between classroom teachers and school librarians; and supports the development of digital literacy skills.

END OF YEAR REPORT Mathematics Department 2017-2018

Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

During the 2017-2018 school year, Mrs. Juliette Ross taught one section of AP Calculus AB, two sections of Pre-Calculus, one section of Algebra 2 Common Core, and four sections of Algebra II Math Lab. AP Calculus and Pre-Calculus have a dual enrollment arrangement with Paul Smith's College and all three classes were distance learning instruction courses for Morristown, Harrisville, and Lisbon Districts. Mrs. McCormick taught two sections of Math 9 which provides students with one and a half periods of mathematics instruction, one section of Algebra, and two sections of Fundamentals of Math with Mrs. Beth Bresett. Mrs. Kathy Swan taught one section of Math 11 which has dual enrollment with Paul Smiths. This course is geared for students who plan to attend a two year college. She also taught one section of Math 10 which provides students with one and a half periods of mathematics instruction, two sections of Algebra 2 Common Core, and one Geometry section. Mrs. Renee Barr taught two sections of Math 10 which provides students with one and a half periods of mathematics instruction, one sections of Geometry, one section on Fundamentals of Geometry, and one section of Geometry AIS. Crossover teacher, Mr. Shawn Paradis taught two sections of Math 9 which provides students with one and a half periods of mathematics instruction and one section of 8th grade accelerated Algebra for the high school. Crossover teacher, Mr. Jeneault taught one section of Statistics which has dual enrollment with Paul Smith's College. We had thirty-three seniors that had a green honor cord from Paul Smiths at graduation.

Throughout the year, the mathematics department implemented the graphing calculator and TI - Smart View Calculator into their lessons on a daily basis. The department also work cooperatively together on aspects of our curriculums. Mrs. McCormick continued to revamp notes, homework, quizzes, Smart notes, and tests that aligned with the New York Standards for the new Algebra Common Core using the eMathinstruction workbook by Kirk Wieler that suits the needs of the Math 9 and 10C students. Mrs. McCormick created notes, homework sheets, guizzes, Smart notes, and tests that aligned with the New York Standards for the new course Fundamentals of Math. Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Swan have worked together to make adjustments to the curriculum for the Algebra II Common Core class. They use a modified version of eMathinstruction by Kirk Wieler. They plan to continue to make modifications based on the students' needs. Mrs. Barr and Mrs. Swan have worked closely together to revise the curriculum for the Geometry Common Core class. Their adjustments were made based on the shared collaboration with colleagues from other districts at workshops they have attended this year. Also, by using the results of the past several CC Geometry regents, they made adjustments that suit their students' specific needs. They plan to continue to make modifications again next year.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

III. Student activities and achievements.

Throughout the year, the members of the Mathematics department implemented the use of the graphing calculator and TI – Smart View Calculator on a daily basis. As we work further with the common core curriculum, we have encouraged students to use the graphing calculators more. There have been many new programs and applications that are required of our students in each of the mathematics courses. We are very grateful that our district has chosen to support our curriculums with the necessary equipment that allows our students use the TI-84plus calculators in our classrooms and at home.

Students in the various mathematics courses were taught how to use mathprint functions such as fractions, summation, logbase. They graphed lines, parabolas, exponentials, absolute value functions, logarithmic functions, trigonometric functions, and higher degree polynomial functions. They also found linear, exponential, quadratic, logarithmic, and sinusoidal regression equations. Students were taught how to create scatter plots, box plots, and find several measures of dispersion, intersection points of systems of equations, and how to use the application inequalities. Algebra 2 common core students used special programs on the calculator for simulations to help better understand inferential statistics. Students were encouraged to use the graphing calculator on a daily basis so that they would become proficient using it and be comfortable using it when they take the regents in June.

Mrs. Barr, Mrs. McCormick, Mr. Paradis, Mr. Jeneault, and Mrs. Swan continue to use the smart board for lessons and to allow students to demonstrate the answers to questions on the smart board to their fellow students. Mrs. Ross is using a new board, Clear touch which does not need a projector. Having no projector has many benefits including a better picture. We are hoping that more department members could possibly transition to the clear touch as well. Students enjoy the clearer picture, especially during note taking time. Mrs. Barr's students have been very busy using vocabulary strategies, creating vocabulary cards, word walls. Students also created quadrilateral trees and did a circle project this year.

- IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

 Mrs. Ross took five students to the Pi Mu Epsilon Mathematics Contest at St. Lawrence University. Our school placed 3rd overall this year. Justyn McCormick was the top senior this year.
- V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

 Mrs. McCormick is on the National Honor Society Induction Committee, Response to Intervention Committee and supervised extra-curricular activities. Mrs. Swan has been a member, and will continue next year, on the District Action Committee, and is a member of the Extra Curricular Eligibility Policy. Mrs. Ross is on the scholarship committee.

For the district Mrs. Swan has also completed her 14th year as Extra Curricular Activities Treasurer. Mrs. Swan implemented the use of Google Classroom into her daily classroom routine. Mrs. Ross used Google Classroom for her Calculus course and had class web pages where students could view the notes online daily.

Mr. Jeneault continued his involvement with Ogdensburg Football as the assistant coach for the OFA JV football team. This past winter Mr. Jeneault was an active member of NNYIHOA as a high school ice hockey official, and USA Hockey as an official. Mr. Jeneault also coached youth hockey in Canton NY for the 2017-2018 season. In the spring Mr. Jeneault was the head coach of the OFA Modified girls lacrosse team.

The department attended Your Right to Know/ Violence Prevention/ Mental Health Awareness Training, the Learning Summit SLL Model Schools, Darkness to Light/Less is More, Extended PD Days, and Google Classroom. Mrs. Ross became a NYS Master teacher in January 2018, and had attended several workshops offered by NYSMT.

Vi. Goals for 2017-2018 - revisited

Mrs. Barr met most of her goals that she set for herself last year. She created notes, homework, quizzes and tests for the common core Geometry curriculum and Fundamentals of Geometry curriculum and continues to update them. She has incorporated Geometry projects into her lessons. She will also continue to adjust and create new review notes for my Geometry classes.

Mrs. McCormick did not met her goal of creating a web page so she can link notes and homework for students to get when they are absent or forgot their notes at school. She will work on meeting this goal next year.

Mrs. Ross completed her goals which were to modify the Pre-Calculus curriculum to reflect what students have learned in the common core curriculum. Mrs. Ross also continued to post to her webpages for her different courses so that students could keep current in courses when absent.

Mrs. Swan's goals were met as well in terms of creating materials and curriculum for the Advanced Algebra Course being offered through Paul Smith's College.

VII. Goals for 2018-2019

Mrs. Barr goals for 2018-2019 are to continue using many of the new strategies she has learned over the past few years such as Bell Ringers, posting agenda and objectives,

non-traditional seating arrangement, and vocabulary strategies and activities. Also, she would like to continue to work on the common core Geometry and Algebra curriculum and adjust her lessons. Mrs. Barr would like to attend summer workshops for Geometry and Algebra to learn about changes in the curriculum. She would also like to look at the CC Algebra curriculum and make adjustments to her notes, homework, tests and quizzes.

Mrs. McCormick would like to make adjustments to her curriculum to best suit the needs of her students and create a web page for students and parents use.

Mrs. Ross' main goal will be to continue to update the Pre-Calculus curriculum using an updated edition of her pre-calculus book. She also plans to utilize google classroom more often. Mrs. Ross would also like to apply more real world problems to her curriculum that are relatable to her students' lives.

Mr. Paradis' main goal is to continue developing the Algebra curriculum to best fit the needs of his advanced 8th graders and to incorporate more graphic organizers into his lessons.

Mrs. Swan will continue to write curriculum and materials for a new College Algebra Class that we implemented this past fall. This course is intended for Juniors or Seniors looking to receive college credit for Intro to Algebra Course through Paul Smith's College. This course is also being offered as a distance learning class next year, so preparations for that transition will need to be made.

Mr. Jeneault would like to continue to modify the notes and projects used to deliver the curriculum. Mr. Jeneault plans to continue teaching excel, word, and powerpoint to his Statistics class. Mr. Jeneault would also like to increase the percentage of statistics students receiving actual credit from Paul Smith's College.

We, once again, spent time making modifications to notes, homework assignments and tests based on the common core modules. We continued to incorporate the State Exam Released Questions into our notes, homework, and bellringers.

We saw positive changes within the State Testing this year: less testing days and less questions per day. Testing items were more in line with what we're doing in the classroom and questions were more age appropriate. Students did not seem as stressed about the tests as in previous years.

We continue to incorporate technology into our classes by using graphing calculators, the smart board (recording lessons when we are absent), and the ELMO.

We continue to use and improve our websites that are linked to OFA's webpage for student use. Classroom notes were available through our websites to keep parents and students informed.

We continue to give the STAR Math Assessment three times a year as another measure of growth for our students.

We continue to include Collins Writing into our curriculum through our notes and homework assignments.

We continue to use PBIS classroom procedures and rewards.

We have our students rate their level of understanding based on a 4 point rubric.

We consistently maintain parent contact through progress reports, emails, and phone calls.


Another goal is to continue to streamline the advanced course for our Grade 7A students.

VII. Goals for 2018-2019


We are once again undergoing staff changes in the middle school so we will continue to work closely to provide our students with easy transitions from elementary to middle school and middle school to high school.

7-12 Vocal Music, Submitted by Sara Pabis

- I. <u>Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.</u>
 - In December, 26 OFA students performed in our school's production of Annie, the musical. Over 800 people were in attendance for the two night showing. Twenty-six students in grades 7 through 12 were in the cast, along with students working backstage, and on the sound and light board. It was the students' first experience of performing with a full live pit orchestra. There was even a guest appearance by Mr. Rabideau as Franklin D. Roosevelt!
 - The winter concert was a success for all students involved. Middle school chorus, high school chorus and jazz rock performed a variety of genres they had memorized.
 - Middle school chorus sang "Siyahamba", a song from Africa, "Better When I'm Dancing", "Bridge Over Troubled Water", and "Nutcracker Jingles, Jingle Bells" sung to the tune of the Nutcracker. The high school chorus sang "Wangol", a Haitian-Creole folk song, "True Light", "Take Me Home", and "12 Days of a Regifted Christmas". The jazz rock ensemble performed the jazz standard "Ain't Misbehavin", and "A Doo-Wop Christmas with You".
 - Jazz rock ensemble performed a repertoire from the winter concert at Kennedy Elementary and Madill Elementary schools. Jazz rock learned one of the Elementary chorus's winter songs, and performed with them. The jazz band also joined us this year to perform a set. We finished the event with caroling at RiverLedge Nursing home in Ogdensburg.
 - For the spring concert, the middle school choir sang, "Beyond the Sea", "Rock And Roll is Here to Stay", a medley of 1950s rock and roll, "Hi Ho! The Rattlin' Bog", "An American Celebration, a patriotic medley". The high school chorus sang "4 Chords", a medley of Pop songs that have the 4 chord structure, "And So it Goes" by Billy Joel, and a "High School Musical Medley". Jazz rock ensemble sang "You Will Be Found from Dear Evan Hansen", and "That Ever I Saw". Due to the high enrollment of very strong female singers, they sang a women's choir

arrangement of the Johnny Cash song, "Will the Circle Be Unbroken". To end the concert, the high school band and chorus combined to play and sing the piece, "When You Believe" from the movie *The Prince of Egypt*.

- Theater tech is in its second year at OFA. Students started the year by working on designing the schools musical production "Annie". They helped to design, make, and paint the set, design the costumes and makeup look, create the program and poster for the show, and advertise in the community. Students also learned how to program and work the light and sound board. During the musical, students ran the light board, spot lights and sound board.
- Students in theater tech are also tasked with the project of helping to pick the
 next musical. They are given specific guidelines for our school's needs, and pitch
 their top two ideas after researching why their show is the correct fit for our next
 musical.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

- 26 seniors were recognized for their participation in the music program at the Spring High School Concert.
- Jazz Rock Ensemble and members from the middle school and high school
 chorus will be ending the year by performing with the seniors at graduation. They
 will be singing Just Believe, a song the seniors helped to pick. Mrs. Paige Billings
 will be accompanying the choir on piano.

III. Student activities and achievements

- Fourteen students auditioned and two high school chorus members were accepted to SLCMEA's Select Vocal Ensemble, and performed at All County Festival B at OFA.
- In November, two students were selected to participate in the Area All State Chorus in Indian River, based on their NYSSMA scores from 2017.
- Twenty-two vocal students attended the NYSSMA solo festival at Carthage High School in April. Four high school students performed a level 6 and earned a 96 or higher. One student earned a 100 on his level 6! Two students performed a level 4 and scored a 28 out of 28.

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement

• Thirteen High School students participated in the All County Festival A High School Chorus in January at SUNY Potsdam.

- Fourteen Middle School students participated in the All County Festival B Middle School Chorus that was hosted at Ogdensburg Free Academy in February.
- Jazz Rock Ensemble members were the opening entertaining act at the Boys and Girls Club Expo in February. They also sang the National Anthem at the Law Enforcement Torch Run in May.

V. <u>Professional growth</u>

 In January, the SLL BOCES held a course on the rollout of the new music and arts standards, presented by Tamara Madeja. The workshop helped us to take our current lesson plans and showed us how to fit them into the new standards.

VI. Goals for 2017-2018 - revisited

- Theater tech was able to produce a successful musical, and have a working knowledge of the sound and light boards.
- High School Chorus was able to tackle a varied repertoire, including songs in foreign languages, and acapella pieces.
- Jazz Rock Ensemble sang very challenging music this year. They were able to sing challenging acapella pieces, and contemporary pieces. They also sang in the community at the two elementary schools, the nursing home, and at the Torch Run.
- Middle School Chorus was able to harmonize in 3 to 4 parts. They sang a varied repertoire.

VII. <u>Goals for 2018-2019</u>

- Theater Tech will be continuing their training in the auditorium on the sound and light boards. They will also be producing another musical, scheduled for November 30 and December 1.
- Middle school chorus will be going from singing two part harmonies, to three and four parts over the course of the year. They will also be learning new music vocabulary, and musicianship skills.
- High school chorus will continue to sing in various genres and explore different cultures through song. They will also continue to hone their musicianship skills through singing four part harmonies.
- Jazz Rock Ensemble will continue to sing in the community, and hope to inspire future singers at the elementary schools.

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

- A stronger emphasis was placed on counting and rhythmic skills during lessons for the school year. A knowledge gap trend was beginning to develop and therefore, all students worked through a methodical counting language from level 1 materials to level 4 materials. This approach will need to continue for Sr. Band next year.
- Again, a continuation of understanding the construction and patterning of scales, arpeggios, and such along with a daily diet of putting it all into practice has developed skill and understanding. This approach will also be continued in the fall.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

- The Winter and Spring concerts were a hit again this year. The music selection for Winter progressed nicely for the materials and skills needed to perform the Spring Concert. In particular, this spring's focus on the Broadway genre was useful. It helped with rhythmic skills, articulation, and style development. The band's performance of the Hamilton medley is proof of that, and the perk to it all was the students enjoyed the music and the technical work.
- 2017 Summer Marching Band's theme was "Thank you to Our City." It featured
 the primary song of "We built this City... on rock n' roll." The intent was to thank
 the City of Ogdensburg for all their support and, of course, the new uniforms. It
 was very well received!
- The schedule for marching band was similar to the year previous and it has
 made many parents and students feel they can fit marching band into their
 summer schedule. Enrollment for the class is currently growing. Hint: The
 show for this summer '18 is the Music of Journey, who was inducted to the Rock
 N' Roll Hall of Fame this past year.

III. Student activities and achievements.

 For 2017-18, 6 Students represented OFA when they participated in the NYSSMA Zone V, VI Area All-state held at the Indian River Central School. This is an awesome experience for all involved from Syracuse to Plattsburgh because all musicians are highly motivated and their speed of progression is very quick.

- OFA, once again, hosted the SLCMEA All-County B Festival. Twelve, 9-12 HS band students participated in the festival and it was a great musical experience for all. Over 400 students performed on the weekend from ages 10 to 18 for 4 ensembles from around the county. Thank you to Sara Pabis, Sarah Hill, and Angela Dwyer for their part in the festival. It was a team success.
- Three students represented OFA in the SLCMEA All-County Jazz Band at Festival A, at the Crane School of Music. Gerard Powers, lead tenor saxophone, Nick LaCombe, trombone and Alec LaCombe, trumpet. They represented OFA exceptionally well.
- OFA's Jazz Band Class- had positive numbers. A good contingent of students
 continue to be interested in the ensemble at OFA. After school is a difficult time
 for all students to be available for the class/rehearsal time but we're lucky
 coaches are willing to share time with our musician-athletes.
- Twenty-One, Grade 9-12 students participated in the NYSSMA Solo
 Festival. Students actively interacted with Smart Music software to assist their
 solo preparation. To ease the schedule conflicts for students, OFA traveled to
 Carthage for the Southern Zone V festival. It was a bit different facility but the
 our students scored very well. Judges were impressed with our musicians ability
 to manipulate technology within the performance of their solo.

- Again this spring the H.S. Concert Band and the Color Guard will support area organizations during their annual remembrance events. The OFA band will participate in the City's Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony in the cemetery on May 28th, the Elk's Flag Day Ceremony at the park on a date TBD around June 14. As well, Garrett Bell and Alec LaCombe will be performing taps at the Blessing of the Seaway and at the Flag retiring ceremony.
- For Expo 2018, The Jazz Band performed on opening night and Gerard Powers and I filled an open slot with saxophone duets on Saturday morning. As well, Ryan McNally (2017 Alumni) and a number of current high school students again performed a set with the "Band Room Band." The OFA band program will be looking to support this event in the future and number of students in high school band have strong connections with the Boys and Girls Club.
- The Jazz Band was invited to perform at Madill and Kennedy schools. The band had a wonderful time and the feedback was complimentary from teachers at both schools. It was a great opportunity to market band to the younger students in the district. This was a shared field trip with the chorus students. All concluded the trip with singing carols at Riverledge. It was a great day and universally appreciated.

- V. <u>Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)</u>
 - NYSCATE training in Potsdam, which was very good connective information for my day to day Google work.
 - Rollout of the new standards presentation provided by SLL BOCES to help teachers link their current lesson plans with the new ESSA standards for the arts.
 - Master Class and concert performance by trumpet player, Chris Botti. He discussed lyric playing on the trumpet which he does beautifully.
 - Master Class and concert performance Tenor Sax, Professor Wolford discussing student preparation of the Telemann Sonata in Cm, level V. This was useful and timely considering we had a student prepping the same solo for their NYSSMA festival.

VI. <u>Goals for 2018-2019</u>

- Primarily, there will be a focus on 7 & 8th grade instrumentalists and their band program. Giving them an identity they can be proud of. I'll be looking to improve student motivation and spark interest to make better music as a team. In a sense, work the students like crazy but have them feel like it's easy and fun.
- Always look for ways to grow the program and involve more students. Especially students who are not particularly active in their school programs currently.
- · Continue to explore and incorporate technology and its use in the classroom.
- Continue to refine and organize the use of space, storage, libraries, inventories, etc. in the music area to make it be more inviting, effective, and efficient.
- Explore a sustainable and living music webpage that is useful and timely.
- Improve cooperation and communication within the music department to promote a dynamic team that feels supported when needed.





Health is always evolving as information changes. I try to keep up with the current trends and information so that I can then pass that information on to my students.

This year, I continued with a host of guest speakers. Kelly Johnson-Eilola is the Coordinator and Charity and Zack are the presenters for Teens HELP. Teens HELP is a project of the Health Initiative and is a NYSDOH funded program to reduce the challenges of teen pregnancy in St. Lawrence County. She provided our students with sexuality education as well as adult preparation skills in areas of healthy relationships, health care literacy and respecting sexual consent.

Hannah, from Planned Parenthood, presented a segment about sexual identity. It focused on vocabulary and using appropriate language. The goal was to create awareness among the students so they would be informed of alternative lifestyles. The result would foster respect for other people's choices.

Reality Check's presentation was about the dangers of tobacco. They brought in pig lungs so students could see the difference between healthy and diseased lungs. They also spoke about the dangers of e-cigarettes.

Michele James from St. Lawrence County STOP-DWI Program talked to the students for two days about the dangers of alcohol.

Renewal House focused on domestic violence and sexual assault. Val included information on the services Renewal House provides and how to recognize when someone is in an unhealthy relationship and how to seek help.

Representatives from Claxton Hepburn Medical Center talked to students about health careers the hospital offers.

For professional growth, I am a member of the Wellness Committee. We have made positive changes to our District Wellness Policy and have put healthy, positive initiatives in place. Some examples include: a celebration cart to encourage healthy, fun celebrations with smoothies and food tasting, encouragement of daily recess for the elementary grades and healthy fund raising for our district. We were awarded money to accomplish some initiatives and to buy athletic equipment to make physical education more fun for everyone.

I continue to provide CPR certification for teachers and coaches who need updates or initial course certification.


Goals for next year include implementing more technology into my classroom and to continue involvement in the Wellness Committee.

END OF YEAR REPORT 2017-2018

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

Amber Henry and Cristy Smith began using a new Earth Science textbook. This textbook incorporates the upcoming next generation science standards with the NYS Science Standards. They both created new notes, worksheets, demonstrations and labs to better align with the new textbook and standards.

The Living Environment course updated with new books this year. <u>Jamie Lopez</u> retyped and formatted 30 new chapters of materials including, all new notes, calendars, worksheet packets, and some new labs. <u>Jamie also made a new regents review book for both class and lab. <u>Lisa Beldock helped her with peer review and editing.</u></u>

<u>Kevin Ross</u> rewrote many chapter quizzes to reflect some regents questions that students tend to find difficult.

Amber, along with <u>Cristy Smith</u>, participated in a mini course on Ecotoxicity along with a mini course on The Ecology of Fresh Water Systems. <u>Amber, Cristy and Matt</u> participated in a book study, Teach Like a Champ through the Master Teacher program. Amber went to many workshops this year including, Teaching Climate Change in Schools, Project based learning, 3-D Learning and New Science Standards, Digging Deeper into Science Standards and the Paul Anderson- New Science Standards conference. Amber will be participating in the second half of the New Science Standards with Paul Anderson this summer at Adirondack College. Amber is the co-advisor for the Science Olympiad team, the Earth Club advisor and was a mentor to four students participating in the Terra Science competition. <u>Jamie Lopez</u> attended all staff development workshops and is personally promoting the positivity project. Jamie dispersed laminated materials to all MS-HS faculty and staff to practice and use in their areas.

As a member of the NYS Master Teacher Fellows, <u>Matt Shaver</u> participated in many activities as professional development.

<u>Cristy Smith</u> is an active participant in the Master Teacher Program, where she receives a minimum of 50 hours of professional development each year. She also is a co-advisor for Science Olympiad, and she represents the science department on the Scholarship Committee. She attended the technology day training, where she learned about various programs and applications.

Matt Shaver's Anatomy course is becoming more streamlined, and more topics are being taught.

Cristy Smith is continuing to learn more about the new science standards through training with the Master Teacher Program. The Science Olympiad team's ranking did improve, and more students received medals this year than last. She also added more visuals/simulations to Earth Science lessons.

VII. Goals for 2017-2018

<u>Amber Henry</u> would like to incorporate more of the New Generation Science Standards and project based learning into her Earth Science curriculum for next year.

<u>Lisa Beldock</u> would like to develop a web page that includes all student notes and worksheets for her Living Environment classes including a complete class syllabus. Lisa would also like to incorporate the positivity project into her classroom and the building. Lisa would also like to create a STEM newsletter for parents about labs and events in the classroom and incorporate the new text into classroom activities and assignments. Lisa would like to increase the number of students involved in IMPETUS, use the computer lab to do simulation activities and create a human body and genetic disorder project.

<u>Jamie Lopez</u> plans to focus more on science literacy and most importantly, character education, via the positivity project.

<u>Kevin Ross</u> wants to maintain a high regents passing percentage. Kevin wants to continue rewriting and reformatting chapter quizzes and test.

As always, $\underline{\mathsf{Mr. Shaver}}$ is looking for ways to alter his teaching of the AP courses to increase the overall average score on the examination.



END OF YEAR REPORT OFA Grades 7/8 Social Studies 2017-2018

Department Curricular Highlights:

- Ms. Hopkins taught three grade levels of Social Studies; 7th grade Early America, 8th grade Modern America, and Global History and Geography 9. She created all new notes for ninth grade to go with the new textbook, because she had not taught regular 9th before, and all of her previous classes have been 9Cs, with a modified curriculum.
- Mr. McRoberts was assigned to 8th grade U.S. History classes and taught the Advanced 8th grade section.
- Mrs. Johnson taught 7th grade U.S. History classes as well as Technology.
- Ms. Hopkins, Mrs. Johnson, and Mr. McRoberts have worked to make the transition to the Common Core Curriculum as seamless as possible with constructed deep reading activities.
- Mr. McRoberts reports that this was the first year he did not start the year with the Civil War. He followed NYS recommendations and he was able to get much further in the book and curriculum for 8th grade. His students completed several Document Based Questions and essays this past year.
- Mrs. Johnson reports that the year began with a map project. Students were to label world maps, and color code these, for map practice, review at the beginning of the year. Her students made pamphlets to encourage people from Europe to settle in any of the original 13 colonies; as William Penn did in the 1700s for Pennsylvania. Students used information gathered both from the textbook and from the library. In the fall, students read the historical novel Toliver's Secret by Esther Wood Brady. This is a story about a very young girl who goes behind the British lines during the American Revolution. Students were able to get a bigger picture of this time and history and how a regular person, young person's, life could be affected by the events of the war. The students already had foundations in the subjects of civil rights as the issue of slavery also is discussed in this novel.
- During the month of February, Black History Month, she taught "The Legacy of Rosa Parks" from Teaching Tolerance. Students realized that curricular areas overlap; especially the link between ELA and Social Studies. By reading the novel *Lyddie* in ELA, students were better able to see the connections. Mrs. Johnson incorporated more writing into grade 7 Social Studies, and the students continued to do a lot of writing this year, as in past years. She worked on DBQs this year to help the students be prepared for 8th grade.

Department Special Events, Projects, and Activity Highlights:

- In October Ms. Hopkins took OFA's largest group of eighth and ninth graders, over 70, to Washington DC. Due to the size of the group, she had to arrange for two sets of flights, two tour busses, and two tour guides. It was an excellent hands-on history experience as always.
- In May, all middle school students participated in Fort La Presentation Day. Students completed research prior to the one-day activities that took place at the site of the Fort. Some students entered into a writing contest about 2012 Founders' Day Essay Contest for students in grades 4-12. Students also created posters prior to the activity day at the fort site.
- All grade 7 students participated in the Founders' Day activities for students in grades 4 and 7. Students walked to the site, viewed and listened to presentations, and participated in activities.
- In the fall, Mr. McRoberts chaperoned the trip to Washington DC. Students enjoyed a fantastic trip, taking in many sites of our nation's capital.
- Mr. McRoberts took part in and really enjoyed the P2 Project presentation he attended at JFK. It was very informative, and he really enjoyed reading <u>Grit</u>, a book by Angela Duckworth.
- Students also had the opportunity to see three OCP productions this year.

END OF YEAR REPORT OFA High School Social Studies 2017-18

Department Curricular Highlights:

- Ms. Hopkins taught Global History. She plans to grow and improve her curriculum. She would like to continue to use technology in her classroom, and has been attending workshops with in-house technology advisor, Bob Ladoucer, to improve her Google skills. She created all new notes for ninth grade to go with the new textbook, because she had not taught regular ed. 9th before. Next year she plans to continue with and add to partner and group activities, and work on 21st century skills to help her students prepare for college and careers.
- Mr. Henry took over for the retired Mr. Snyder as Department Chair. He reports that notes in classes are done using PowerPoint and SMART Notebook so that students need to process information through listening, reading and viewing in both U.S. History and AP U.S. History Classes. Cornell notes were used again this year and were very effective. History Alive activities were used throughout the year, meaning students were using a variety of ways to generate knowledge and increase problem-solving skills. Group work was done on almost a daily basis by creating newscasts, charting Regents style essays, compare/contrast diagrams and many more activities. He used a bell ringer daily as well as putting up a daily agenda and daily objectives. Item analysis of the Regents Exam was done again this year. He is currently working with BOCES to make U.S. History in Film class a distance learning class next fall. Mr. Henry taught AP U.S. History to one Lisbon and one Clifton-Fine student via distance learning.
- Mr. McRoberts taught the following high school courses; Psychology during the first semester and Sociology during the second semester. He reports that the students in Sociology read a BOCES lending library book titled, The Beans of Egypt, Maine. This chronicles the life of a poverty-stricken family in Egypt, Maine. This led to question and answer sessions and general discussion of societal issues.
- Mrs. Ladouceur taught Economics, Government, Latin American Studies and AP European History this year. Her economics course focused on supply and demand, personal finance, entrepreneurship and the stock market. Students did several projects this year that focused on presenting economic ideas visually and orally. The students developed ideas for inventions that had to be presented in the "Shark Tank" project. Students also played the stock market game and created our own economies in the "Island Project". Her Government class focused on the creation of our government, citizenship, political parties, interest groups, and voting. Students did several projects focusing on the Constitution. The students ranked the amendments by matter of importance and then created their own amendment and presented it to the class. The class voted on the amendments using the actual amendment process used in Congress. Mrs. Ladouceur had seven OFA students and two Lisbon students take AP Euro this year. Students read a collegiate text that covers European history from the Renaissance to today to prepare for the exam.
- Mr. Price's position as OEA President has given him insight into the APPR and the Common Core. This year marked the first year of the transition Regents Exam in Global History and Geography. There was a sense of relief that 9th grade material would not be included in the exam which reduced the topics for necessary review. It also allowed for more skill building exercises in the 9th grade curriculum. Students engaged in many Socratic dialogues in order to better comprehend difficult global issues. Mr. Price spent the year interning with Mrs. Luckie in the Middle School office, which allowed him to learn more about the role of the social studies department in guiding reading and writing instruction across the curriculum.
- Mr. Tebo continued using Microsoft Power Point to enhance his students understanding of the 9th & 10th grade Global History and Geography curriculum. The use of Power Point has opened new avenues to him as another means of evaluating his students. He has also used a program through BOCES where teachers can download historical video clips and show them in class. This has allowed for further enrichment of the social studies curriculum.

Department Special Events, Projects, and Activity Highlights:

This October Ms. Hopkins took OFA's largest group of eighth and ninth graders, over 70, to Washington DC. Due to the size of the group, she had to arrange for two sets of flights, two tour busses, and two tour guides. It was an excellent hands-on history experience as always.


- Mrs. Ladouceur had the Board of Electors come in, presented important voting procedures to all seniors, and had a mock election using actual voting machines. I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

- This year we were fortunate to have purchased several new machines within the Technology Department. With the help of Mr. Kendall, we now have a Boss Laser machine that has the ability to cut and engrave all kinds of materials, from paper to wood and plexiglass. With this new addition students from wood working class and CAD have been able to personalize their projects with custom graphics and text. The students have really taken to this machine and have become very creative in ways to use this machine, they are excited.
- We now have an embroidery machine to add to the graphic design, layout of
 materials, and machine setup skills of the students. We are still in the development
 stages for software, but more will be available in the next school year for this
 machine.
- This year we have acquired a new large format printer to replace the old machine

VII. Goals for 2018-2019



- Classes taught this year: Art 7, Studio Art, Painting, Sculpture and Independent Study. I
 continue to hone my curriculum revising old lessons and inventing new in order to provide

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Interscholastic Athletic Programs

End of Year Report (2017-2018)

On August 1 Ogdensburg Free Academy, previously approved and recognized by the New York State Education Department as a NYS Certified Agency, offering courses of study in CPR/AED and First Aid knowledge and skills for coaches [meeting the provisions of Education Law 3001(b)(c) and Regulations of the Commissioner of Education, Section 135.5], was the site of the OFA Athletic Department Coaches' Certification Session. All existing members of the certification/re-certification staff are certified as instructors to teach the NYSED approved CPR/AED and First Aid courses for coaches; several members of this highly proficient staff assisted with our annual certification session. Many coaches from Ogdensburg and surrounding communities successfully completed the required objectives and skills evaluations, in accordance with the curriculums of the NYSED and the American Heart Association (AHA).

On August 5 Ogdensburg Free Academy, designated as a "Testing Site" for the NYSPHSAA Section 10 Regional Advance Placement Performance Test (APP Test), was the host location for the Fall Sports Season Session. The OFA Athletic Department organized, coordinated, and administered this test, with individual student-athletes from several surrounding school districts attending including: Canton, Clifton-Fine, Gouverneur, Hammond, Heuvelton, Lisbon, Madrid-Waddington, Massena, Morristown, Norwood-Norfolk, Potsdam, and OFA.

On August 25 and 26 the OFA Blue Devils Boys Soccer Program kicked off the Northern Athletic Conference Season by hosting the *Annual Gerard Cring Memorial Boys Soccer Tournament* at the Varsity and Junior Varsity levels. Several local schools participated including: Brushton-Moira, Gouverneur, Hammond, Lisbon, Madrid-Waddington, Salmon River, and OFA.

On August 29 and 30 the OFA Blue Devils Girls Soccer squads hosted the *Annual Girls Soccer Tournament* at the Varsity and Junior Varsity levels. Several local schools participated including: Gouverneur, Heuvelton, Lisbon, Madrid-Waddington, Morristown, and OFA.

On September 15 the Community of Ogdensburg paid homage and celebrated two highly revered Members of OFA History. To honor and commemorate their historic impact on the game of football (The innovation they pioneered, soccer style kicking, revolutionized place kicking.), the Ogdensburg Pride and Beautification Commission paid tribute to Peter Gogolak and Charlie Gogolak by proclaiming this date as "Gogolak Brothers Day". A monument dedication ceremony was held in the Ogdensburg City School District's Monument Park, adjacent to the OFA multiplex/turf field. A synopsis of the plaque immortalizing the siblings reads: "Peter Gogolak – Class of 1960 and Charlie Gogolak – Class of 1962. Brothers who after fleeing the Hungarian Revolution in 1956, graduated from Ogdensburg Free Academy. While there, they adapted soccer style kicking to the American game of football. Their style became standard operating procedure at all levels of the sport. To this day, it remains a legacy, designating OFA its birthplace." (The dedication ceremony featured Peter Gogolak, in person, and Charlie Gogolak, via Skype.)

On October 11 the OFA Blue Devil Volleyball teams hosted *Volley 4 Sara* night and designated their games, versus Massena, as <u>fundraiser games</u> to raise funds for Cancer Awareness. Proceeds were donated to, and earmarked for, a member of the Lake Placid High School Volleyball Team who was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma.

End of Year Report (2017-2018)

On October 13 the OFA Varsity Cheerleaders celebrated their Annual Junior Cheerleader Clinic with a performance of approximately 61 cheerleaders from grades 2-6. They performed at half time during the final home Varsity Football game against Tupper Lake. The OFA Athletic Department once again organized, coordinated and administered this test, with individual student-athletes from several surrounding school districts attending including: Canton, Chateaugay, Colton-Pierrepont, Edwards-Knox, Gouverneur, Hammond, Herman-DeKalb, Heuvelton, Lisbon, Madrid-Waddington, Morristown, Norwood-Norfolk, St. Lawrence Central, Tupper Lake, and OFA.

On October 27 the OFA Varsity Football team became the Section 10, Class C, Champions and earned a berth to the NYSPHSAA Class C Football Tournament.

On October 28 the OFA Boys Varsity Soccer team became the Section 10, Class B, Co-Champions and earned a berth to the NYSPHSAA Boys Class B Soccer Tournament.

On November 1 the OFA Varsity Volleyball team became the Section 10, Class B, Champions and earned a berth to the NYSPHSAA Class B Volleyball Tournament.

On November 1 the OFA Boys Varsity Soccer team competed in the NYSPHSAA Boys Class B Soccer Tournament First Round/Sub-Regional Playoff game at Plattsburgh High School in Plattsburgh, NY. Our Mighty Blue Devils played a tremendous game. The game is officially recorded as a tie (0-0); however, Section 7 Champions, Saranac Central, won advancement in the New York State Tournament Bracket by winning the shootout (3-2).

On November 3 the OFA Varsity Football team competed in the NYSPHSAA Class C Football Tournament First Round/Sub-Regional Playoff game at Potsdam High School in Potsdam, NY. Our Mighty Blue Devils conquered Section 7 Champions, Saranac Central, (50-20) and advanced in the New York State Tournament Bracket.

On November 7 the OFA Varsity Volleyball team competed in the NYSPHSAA Class B Volleyball Tournament First Round/Sub-Regional Playoff game Playoff game at Massena High School in Massena, NY. Our Lady Blue Devils played fantastic sets, but were downed by Section 2 Champions, Hudson Falls, (3-0).

Assignments are given for each marking period based on the number of pages to be completed, as determined by our agreement with Balfour Publishing Company. For the tenth year, the entire yearbook was created online using StudioWorks, with a final deadline of April 16th, which was met one week later with hard work from the very small yearbook staff. The books arrive in early June and are distributed to the student body by the members of the yearbook staff. This year the yearbook contributors are particularly proud of the consistency among sections, as well as the cover design, which was a collaboration between our staff, yearbook company advisor, and cover artists from the yearbook company, as well as the presence of our "Behind the Scenes" theme throughout the publication.

FUND RAISERS: The staff of the 2018 Devilog, with the assistance of Mrs. Frank, sold ads to community businesses on a sliding price scale depending upon ad size to offset the cost of yearbook production. Yearbook staff also sold parent ads to parents of senior students. The sale of yearbooks took place online through smart-pay.com, an affiliate of Balfour Publishing Company, to minimize the amount of money handled in the school building. Yearbook sales were comparable to last year and positive feedback was received about online ordering. Yearbook staff members sent handwritten notes of thanks to all business that purchased an ad in the 2018 publication, with the hope of increasing/maintaining ad sales for 2019. This task was encouraged by a supplementary yearbook publication aligned with the Common Core learning standards, and proved effective in maintaining or increasing ad sales over 2017. In an effort to make the yearbook more affordable to additional students, our yearbook representative worked to lower our pricing by \$10 to \$60 per book and we sold a quantity of books early for 2018, with a flyer included in our 2017 books offering a deal on personalization as an early ordering incentive.



GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT GRADES 7-12 RICHARD CHRISTY DEPARTMENT HEAD

The purpose of this report is to present an overview of the Guidance services at OFA for the 2017-2018 school year. Mr. Christy and Mrs. VanTassel serve students in grades 9-12 while Mrs. Verville serves students in grades 7-8. The counseling services for our CSE students in grades 7-8 were provided by Mrs. Verville; counseling services for students in grades 9-12 were split (alphabetically) by Mr. Christy and Mrs. VanTassel. The ACCESS-VR (formally known as VESID) services were coordinated through the high school guidance office for our district students during the 2017-18 school year.

- 10 seniors received diploma distinction "Mastery in Math" and 13 seniors received "Mastery in Science" having earned an 85 or higher in three regents' exams in respective discipline. 8 seniors received distinction in both Math and Science.
- 33% of college-bound seniors received scholarships
- 23 seniors were National Honor Society members
- 12 seniors were Business & Marketing Honor Society members
- 4 seniors were Vocational Technical Honor Society members
- 25 seniors graduated with honors
- 48 seniors received some advanced college credit upon gradating

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS:

In addition to the annual programs our office offers to students and parents including. The College Fair, SUNY Road Show, Junior Information Night, and Financial Aid Awareness Night, the following activities/events occurred this year:

- OFA hosted our first annual Health Career Awareness Fair in conjunction with Claxton Hepburn. Students from OFA, Morristown, Heuvelton and Lisbon also attended.
- Mr. Christy coordinated a self-defense seminar for senior female students through PE classes.
- Through collaboration with United Helper's MOSAIC, a Childcare coordinator was placed at OFA two days a week from April-June. This will continue for the 18-19 school year.
- This year we had the Executive Director of HESC provide a workshop for students and families regarding the Excelsior Scholarship Program that provides free tuition to SUNY schools.
- An information session for students interested in job shadowing at Claxton Hepburn hospital was hosted.
- Counselors received updates on of all new Pathways to graduation, as they were made available to us from State Education Department. This year especially was a very busy year in this regard.
- OFA participated in the Distance Learning Network as a provider. We offered classes to students from Heuvelton (3) Harrisville (3) Lisbon (2) Norwood (7) and Morristown (2). We already have students from other districts registered for the '18-19 year.
- SUNY Canton came to OFA to assist students with the Freshman enrollment process for their school.
- Identified students for Liberty Partnership Program, Migrant Tutor Program, Youth Advocate Program and for Student of the Month offered by the Greater Ogdensburg Chamber of Commerce.
- Hosted two students from St. Lawrence University who provided tutoring for our students in the fall semester.
- All counselors along with OFA staff attended a Staff Development day program "Living Above and Below the line: the Power of Choice" in the fall and another titled "Understanding Parenting with Love and Leadership" with Dr. John Rosemond
- Guidance Direct college search for all Grade 11 and Grade 12 was completed in preparation for the annual College Fair.
- "Gateways to Careers" was attended again this year by the junior class and Northwest Tech seniors. Ms. McLean and Mrs. Putman again this year along with the Guidance staff prepared our students for the interview process.
- Mr. Christy and Mrs. VanTassel attended SUNY OP Inform and the NYSFAA Financial Aid workshops hosted locally.

- Mrs. Verville continues to run WEB (Where Everyone Belongs) training for peer leaders in grade 8 to assist students transitioning to the middle school. This year, 14 new WEB leaders were trained.
- Mrs. Verville continues to schedule our monthly meetings with Probation for both middle school and high school.

OTHER TASKS AND DUTIES PERFORMED

- Conducted individual senior interviews with parents and students.
- Contacted parents of seniors who failed courses each marking period and facilitated contact between staff and parents to help resolve issues leading to failures.
- Contacted parents of students who had missed three consecutive days of school.
- Scheduled and participated in orientation for incoming 7th grade students.
- Monitored weekly reports progress reports report cards for students.
- Held annual Junior Night for students to meet with college Financial Aid and Admissions representatives. We invited bordering districts to attend.
- Identified and arranged for 20 female students to attend the Women in Engineering Day held at SUNY Canton.
- Reviewed all PSAT results with 10th and 11th grade students and set them up to have individualized SAT prep through the College Board and the Khan Academy.
- Served as school liaison with LPP program, an early college awareness program available for our students who qualify.
- Managed information for all students in Grades 7-12 who receive Academic Intervention Services.
- Reviewed student schedules to ensure students are meeting graduation requirements.
- Met with students who are academically "at-risk" for failure.
- 10th grade visitation to Northwest Tech.
- Visited 8th grade Science class for Grades 9-12 guidance orientation purposes.
- Continued to honor parent requests for tutoring on a case by ease basis.
- Referred and coordinated all ACCESS-VR interviews.
- Referred students and parents to outside agencies including Mobile Integration Team (MIT team)
- Coordinated continuation of academic coursework for students who are in institutional settings.
- Attended CSE meetings/annual reviews.
- Attended Superintendent formal and informal hearings.
- Attended attendance hearings for students with Mrs. Tuttle and Mr. Bjork.
- All 8th grade students completed a detailed interest inventory and researched jobs based on results.
- Oversaw and coordinated the administration of testing including SAT, ACT, AP, CAT Terra Novas and other state testing.
- Assisted the CSE with process for CSE testing.
- Registered students for Talented Juniors (SLU) and Project Challenge (Clarkson) enrichment programs.

The list above is not a complete list of duties performed but highlights those that are very important.

We continue to be a test center for the SAT's ACT's in September, October, November, December, January, April, May and June. Over 40 OFA students tested for the SAT I and over 20 OFA students for the ACT this year. Average SAT/ACT scores for the Class of 2018 are not available at this time.

For the Class of 2017 we had 28 students take the SAT and 20 students take the ACT. Results are listed in the tables below:

As you can see, we were above the State average in both Critical Reading and Math. We were also above the national average in Math and Critical reading. This is the third consecutive year we have been above both the National and State level in Critical Reading and Math.

We were above the National Average in all four tests but below the New York State average in all four tests.

PSA1'S were administered in October for Class of 2019. We tested 55 students (50 grade 11 and 5 grade 10): We report an average score of 504 in Critical Reading, 520 in Math. A score of 500 is considered an average score. 66% of our students met the benchmark for college and career readiness in ELA, 52% met the benchmark in Math and 46% met the benchmark for both.

OFA students continue to participate in the Advanced Placement testing program. Mr. Christy served as the testing coordinator. Listed below are the numbers for the 2017-2018 school year:

The College Board recommends that college credit be awarded for a score of 3 or higher however each college may have its own policy regarding the awarding of credit.

We also continue to have students participate in a dual enrollment program offered by SUNY Potsdam (Spanish and French IV) and Paul Smith's (Pre- Calculus and Statistics) and St. Lawrence University (Spanish V) and SUNY Canton (Accounting). These agreements continue to help our students make a successful transition from high school to college and for many, give them the confidence they need to start college knowing they have already successfully completed a college level course. As mentioned earlier, we are looking to possibly expand our offerings with SUNY Canton for the future.

We did not have any students who took the TASC exam this year, though we do have 3 students on track to take the exam next year through the Community Connections program.

With regard to professional development, we continue to have the support of the district to attend many workshops related to our profession. Workshop topics attended this year included:

- 2017-18 NYS Financial Aid School Counselor workshop.
- Our Fall staff development day was spent here at OFA doing a Poverty workshop that was very powerful and resonated with us all.
- Our Spring Staff development Day was spent at SUNY Potsdam listening to Dr. John Rosemond present Understanding Parenting with Love and Leadership.

In addition to educational advisement, the Guidance office continues to provide psychoemotional counseling services to our student population.

This year, we again continued to work with a number of students who were afflicted with alcohol, substance abuse, and mental health issues. This year, more so than in past years, we worked with the St. Lawrence County Probation and the St. Lawrence Children and Youth services. We are seeing a rise in the number of intensive case management services that some of our students need. To that end, we partnered with United helpers MOSAIC and now have a child care coordinator in our office and will continue to have this service available to us next year.


Furthermore, issues that we are confronted with on a regular basis include, but are not limited to, self-harm, specifically cutting-along with high levels of anxiety. This seems to be our number one issue. These instances along with social anxiety affect many of our students who may end in placement at SLPC or on home tutoring. We worked very closely with the education program at SLPC to keep our students on track during their absence. This year was average to above average in terms of numbers of students who were temporarily receiving instruction through SLPC. Other issues include family problems, divorce and separation, relationship issues, and physical and sexual abuse. Hot line calls and PINS referrals were made as situations warranted it. While we provide brief treatment to our students and families, probably even more importantly, we serve as a community referral resource.

Overall, we had a very successful year. We are sad to say good-bye to Kathy Verville who served our Middle school students well for the past 8 years. We also say goodbye to Lynnette VanTassel who will be leaving our department to lead the district as the Committee on Special Education Chairperson. We look forward to welcoming Katrina Putman in the high school guidance position and Kerri Tenyeck in the middle school position.

Our goals for next year include:

- Update our Guidance home page with more useful and relevant information for families and students.
- Look for opportunities to use Social media more effectively to communicate with students and families.
- Work to develop and maintain a stronger peer tutoring program utilizing National Honor Society and Key Club students.
- Continue to seek programs that will assist our students with transitions to post-secondary education opportunities and how to finance them.
